Viral pathogens, social distancing, PPE and PPP, antibodies, vaccines, furloughs, food shelves... this is our new nomenclature and it is indicative of turbulent times. There is a new, abiding anxiety underlying everything that we do, both in our personal and professional lives.

Toto, we are not in Kansas anymore.

It has been anything but business as usual at HSCC these last four months. However, through the pandemic haze there are silver linings. I feel so fortunate to work with a talented, committed staff who have made operating adjustments on the turn of a dime so that, as an essential business, we could continue to serve our community. I am grateful for a Board who is supportive and decisive when there is so little predictability and so much uncertainty surrounding us.

If anything has remained routine, it is the high level of care that the animals receive from our staff and foster families. Every day, animals get the love, attention, and medical care that they need as they await their new home. Many community animals have significant behavioral challenges and medical needs and our staff act as 24/7 rehabilitators so that these animals can live their best lives with their chosen people. Our Surrender Prevention program requests are at an all- time high, and our new Pet Helpline has proven to be a valuable resource for many. Our pet food shelf has been warmly received by the public, and our newly renovated medical clinic will make it much easier for us to treat our patients affordably, efficiently and effectively. Our humane education camps have officially begun, prioritizing the safety of our students and staff. These programs and services come at a significant cost and we could not provide them without the generosity of our community.

The human-animal bond is stronger than ever and demand for companion animals has increased during the pandemic, but supply has not kept pace. Our primary obligation is to the people and animals in the Chittenden and Grand Isle communities, but transporting and re-homing animals from high volume shelters is important to our operations too; it helps animals who may be euthanized; it supplies loving pets to our adopters; and provides a revenue stream allowing HSCC to better serve our community needs. Unfortunately, Covid guidelines currently prevent us from transporting animals from outside the state, making community support to continue our mission driven work more critical now than ever. In a typical week, HSCC sees hundreds of people and animals walk through our doors. With our facility closed due to Covid, we have provided alternative ways to offer services. With the health and safety of our staff and the public in mind, we hope to reopen our facility soon.

In the meantime, know that we are here for you - regardless of your backstory, your ethnicity, your socioeconomic status, or your religious affiliation. HSCC unites in solidarity to combat the other virus in our midst – the one that propagates systemic racial inequity, discrimination, and the pervasive disrespect of our brothers and sisters. We renew our commitment to provide judgement and biasfree community services. We listen, we learn and we improve. HSCC welcomes all creatures, both two and four legged, with open arms. We continue to thrive and prosper because of, not in spite of, our uniqueness.

If what's past is prologue, then one thing is certain - better days lay ahead. On behalf of all of us at HSCC, thank you for your trust, kindness, and continued support.

Surrender Prevention in Action: Josie's Journey

Josie was adopted by her family from a Tennessee rescue in 2014. Though very shy, her family's love and care helped coax Josie out of her shell. Then in September 2019, Josie's house was sold and her family found themselves in a very challenging situation.

"With a poor credit score, Josie, Miley the cat, and I quickly became homeless. We couch surfed and stayed in hotels while I continued to work for Delta Airlines. The stress was unbelievable and I could see it taking effect on Josie. Economic Services of Vermont recommended The Good Neighbor Program at HSCC. I had no choice - I had to get Josie stable. With a broken heart, I met with Cynthia (HSCC's Animal Care Manager) and bawled as she took Josie and me into her office and ever so gently helped me relinquish Josie for 2 weeks. She was amazina. I called and checked on Josie a few times and she always made



me feel like Josie was on 'vacation'. Then I got the call from Heather (HSCC's Medical Care Manager). I cried as she



explained Josie's teeth were really bad. She most likely was in pain and asked if I would I be interested in a program called the **Rainy Day Pet Fund**? Covid-19 was now settling in and Josie again needed stability, so I flew her to Oklahoma City to stay with my daughter for a bit. Upon her return to Vermont, Josie had dental surgery at Green Mountain Animal Hospital with the support of HSCC's Fund.

Iosie and I are so grateful we were supported by HSCC. Josie is now toothless and seems to have more pep in her step. Homelessness affects all family members and Josie has been through a lot. She is my emotional support dog and my very Best Friend. We have since found a lovely apartment in Burlington and she seems much happier."- Josie's mom



Scotty's Story: Former Stray to Family Member

Scotty came to HSCC in February 2020 after being trapped at a feral cat colony in South Burlington. He arrived in rough shape; he was severely matted, had broken teeth, conjunctivitis, an ear infection, and was frightened. Scotty is also FIV+, meaning his immune system has a difficult time fighting off infections.

HSCC set out to improve Scotty's health and place him in a safe and loving home. Along with a whole lot of TLC, Scotty received dental care, was neutered, shaved (no easy task!), and treated

for his ear infections. Before long, Scotty started to look and act like a different cat!

Scotty's big day arrived in March when he was adopted by his new loving family. He now has two feline friends and a family who gives him the time and care he needs to thrive. Scotty is



also starting his next chapter with a brand new name, Dandelion! His family says they were inspired by his lion-esque hairstyle and brave heart.

"The first two days were rough for him. He was scared, particularly when we went to the vet for a check up. Since then he has made great strides. We changed his diet and he is now feeling sooo much better. He loves his new home and all the great food!! Thank you HSCC for trusting us to care for him." - Scotty's (Dandelion's) family
