

A MESSAGE FROM OUR PRESIDENT & CEO

It often feels like everything in life is conditional. Prosperity, careers, relationships, politics - all rely on some form of quid-pro-quo. You scratch my back, I'll scratch yours. This is especially true in our capitalistic society.

Then I consider the ways that altruism challenges that theory. For example, look at the ways in which community service organizations and non-profits give so much more to others than they take for themselves.

This has never been more apparent to me than when I began working at the Humane Society. Over the last 5 years, I have observed our staff and volunteers going above and beyond to help animals. Yes, staff *do* get a paycheck for their work — but the value of what they sow is far greater than the monetary rewards they reap.

In the past year, our Community Pet Clinic team performed well over a thousand low-cost surgeries and wellness visits with compassion and skill. Animal care staff patiently cared for nearly 1,300 animals. Customer care staff ensured all pets found loving homes. Dedicated volunteers gave animals the attention they needed. Our outreach team helped people in crisis keep the pet that provides them companionship and solace. Our administrative team worked overtime supporting our frontline. Donors committed funding so that we could continue our work. These acts of kindness may not always be entirely selfless, but they are motivated by something far more profound than a transaction.

For me, 2022 was a celebration of our amazing staff and volunteers - those who make HSCC the vital community organization it is today. They affirm what our pets teach us: that many things, especially love and kindness, are unconditional, and that personal gains can be measured by the welfare of others.



VOLUNTEERS: THE BACKBONE OF HSCC!



We can always rely on our highly dependable and deeply dedicated volunteers to help us get the job done. They are the reason we are able to give so many deserving animals a

second chance in life, and we are so grateful for all that they do. In 2022, we had just over **130 volunteers supporting us** in critical areas including animal care, dog walking, shelter cleaning, adoptions, event support, and so much more!

FOSTER FAMILIES: CREATING TEMPORARY LOVING HOMES



HSCC has a foster base of 186 people who take in animals who are too young, ill, or stressed to be safely housed in the shelter. Last year, we expanded our foster engagement to include Pawjama Parties, where

folks can take home a dog for the weekend, as well as our **Adoption Ambassador Program**, allowing adoptable animals to be housed in foster homes instead of the shelter.

STAFF DARLING PIPPA MAKES A FULL RECOVERY



While some animals make a quick stopover at HSCC on their way to a new home, others need a little more time with us to get ready for their next adventure.

When Pippa arrived at HSCC, she had been removed from her home because of a local cruelty and neglect case. The 5 year-old dog was completely emaciated and so weak she was unable to walk. She had a giant hematoma in her ear, scars all over her face, and several rib and vertebral fractures in various stages of healing.

Despite the heartbreaking abuse she had suffered, Pippa remained gentle and trusting with HSCC staff. After nearly four months in our care, sweet Pippa finally found her new home!

With Pippa, it's the opposite... she's so friendly and eager for attention, I often have to ask parents if their kids can please pet Pippa!"


Elliot was fostered by one of our shelter veterinarians, who noticed that he was drinking and urinating more than a typical kitten. Bloodwork revealed that he

had diabetes insipidus — a rare illness that can occur when head trauma disrupts the function of the hypothalamus or pituitary gland.







She was spayed prior to adoption, but when she came to our Community Pet Clinic (CPC) for a Wellness Visit, our team found multiple mammary masses, which can often be cancerous. **Eno's new mom wanted to do everything possible to keep Eno healthy.**

After x-rays to ensure there were no masses indicating cancer, HSCC provided two low-cost procedures to remove Eno's mammary chains and biopsy the masses.

We were all relieved when the results showed the masses were non-cancerous! Thanks to the CPC's low-cost services, **Eno** was able to get the care she needed at an affordable cost to her owner.
